Our newsletter is filled to the brim. Spring is our busiest season, with daffodils blooming, gardens growing, tree plantings and two important fundraising events.



New Hope Flora Cottage is owned and run by Donna Marshall, a longtime friend of Bucks Beautiful and a 30 year veteran of the floral design industry. I chatted with Donna recently about what makes her business special and why she supports Bucks Beautiful.

Tell us about your business?

Nestled in Solebury Township, New Hope Flora Cottage is a micro flower farm dedicated to growing fresh, seasonal blooms. We specialize in handcrafted floral arrangements designed to celebrate special moments or simply brighten someone's day. Beyond individual customers, we also work with organizations to create memorable floral experiences for events and gatherings. From everyday flowers to special events - Our commitment to locally grown flowers ensures freshness, sustainability, and a personal touch in every arrangement.

How did you get involved with Bucks Beautiful?

We need to go back 27 years, when Bucks Beautiful held the garden fair at Delaware Valley University the week after the Philadelphia Flower Show. I knew I had found a like-minded community because we all shared a passion for cultivating beauty. I have been involved with the organization since that time and then became a business member once my business had started.



When people think about flowers, there are similar business in the area. What makes yours stand out?

At New Hope Flora Cottage, we take pride in offering locally grown, freshly cut flowers right from our property. When additional flowers are needed, we prioritize local growers first, expand to domestic sources if necessary, and turn to international suppliers only as a last resort.

Our arrangements primarily come in vases, making them easier to care for and enjoy. We also educate our customers about seasonal blooms, ensuring you receive the freshest, most fragrant flowers available. By choosing local, in-season flowers, you're supporting the local economy and reducing carbon emissions from long-distance shipping. Plus, our blooms stay fresh for 5–10 days with proper care—lasting longer and bringing more joy!

Do you grow your own flowers?

Yes, we grow our own flowers without pesticides, ensuring fresh and sustainable blooms. Our growing season runs from April to September, and during the winter months, I focus on continuing education and planning next season's plantings.

What are the occasions where people should consider flowers?

I may be a little biased, but I believe fresh flowers are for any occasion —or no occasion at all. They uplift your mood, ease stress, and inspire creativity, making any space feel warm and inviting. Our locally grown, pesticide-free blooms (available April–September) bring beauty for special moments like birthdays, anniversaries, sympathy, weddings, or formal events. But you don't need a reason to enjoy fresh flowers!



How do customers do business with you?

At New Hope Flora Cottage, we're more of a farm than a traditional retail shop, so our website serves as the main portal for most of our business—about 80% of orders come through there. Why? Because most days, you'll find me out in the garden, not sitting behind a desk! That said, I'm always happy to connect with customers by email or phone, especially with our wonderful regulars who I know well from past orders. Once your arrangement is ready, you can choose to have it delivered (within 10 mile radius) or pick it up. We're here to make your floral experience as convenient and personal as possible!

What deserves a special mention?

My future plans, include offering on-site floral workshops. I feel that people enjoying gathering with a common goal of creating. My shop is one that is relaxed and welcoming to all levels of floral knowledge. I'm open to hearing ideas for topics that people would love to explore, so I welcome anyone to get in touch and share their interests.

Additionally, I'm eager to collaborate with other floral designers, both locally and from out of town, who need workshop space and refrigerated storage prior to an event. They can either use my flowers or bring their own. If this sounds like something you'd be interested in, feel free to reach out to learn more!







Start with the Perfect Soil


It is that time of the year when you walk the aisles of your favorite garden center, marveling at all the many types of plants available. You have visions of beautiful grandeur surrounding your home as you carefully select the combination of plants, herbs and vegetables you plan to add. I encourage you to just pause for a moment and "think like a plant." Consider all the needs of your plant to continue growing and producing abundant flowers or fruit, such as lighting conditions, water requirements and soil structure. The performance of all plant material starts with the health of the soil it is planted in.



Good soil provides plant materials with suitable texture and structure for root formation, nutrients for plant growth, good drainage or water retention for plant survivability and a pH range of 6.0 to 7.0 for best nutrient absorption. Bucks County is known for its clay soil base. If you have ever dug into our clay soil, you will know that it is dense and does not offer optimal drainage or soil aeration. This is where adding soil amendments can assist us enriching soil for optimum our plant Soil modify performance. amendments condition of our soil. Specifically in clay-based soils

we can use soil amendments to improve soil aggregation, increase soil porosity and permeability, increase nutrient infiltration and improve root penetration.

At Seasons Garden Center in Washington Crossing, we offer our clients several types of soil amendments. Our most popular soil amendment is the Master Nursery Bumper Crop Organic Soil Builder. This "one stop shop" soil amendment is a tested combination of sphagnum peat to maintain pore space, aged wood fiber, cured compost aged bark, lobster meal to make plants stronger, worm castings to provide activated minerals, kelp meal and dehydrated poultry manure to green up your plants. The worm castings or worm manure are particularly effective due to their slow-release qualities, which allow for nutrients to be released over a four month time period. On top of all these great components, they have also inoculated the mix with endo mycorrhizal fungi to increase the root systems' surface area. This mix has a pH of 6.5 to help maintain an acidic pH level in your soil.





Many seasoned gardeners rely on Coast of Maine's Quoddy Compost Blend with Lobster and Crab on their vegetable crops and specifically, use it to prevent Blossom End Rot on their tomato crop. Sourced from Quoddy Head, Maine, this mix includes lobster and crab meal, compost and sphagnum peat moss. It works well to revitalize the soil, aid in water retention or drainage and aerate the soil. Rich in chitin from the seafood, this mix produces stronger plants that are more resistant to disease.

We also recommend Coast of Maine's Schoodic Mix of Composted Manure Blend. Sourced from the Schoodic Peninsula in Maine, this mix is composed of composted cow manure, sphagnum peat moss and aged bark. Composted cow manure is superior to fresh manure because it has been heated above 145 degrees F to kill most pathogens and weed seeds and stabilizes the organic matter.



Soil amendments should be added to the soil at planting time by digging your hole twice as large as the root ball and creating a 50/50 mix of soil amendment and existing soil to use to back fill the area in the hole around the root ball. This rich, amended soil will act as the perfect transition area for those young roots to develop. Soil amendments can also serve to condition larger areas of soil by adding a 2" topcoat of soil amendment and working that into the upper 6" of soil. Lawns can be revitalized by adding a 1/2" layer of soil amendment to the lawn surface and raking it into existing grass, adding new seed where needed.

Your year of abundant flowers and edible crops starts with creating the perfect soil. Hopefully, you will "think like a plant" and provide your plants with the optimum environment for them to thrive. Remember to "Just Keep Blooming!"
